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Manager's Corner



As I am sure many of you are aware, several years ago the Grayhawk Community Association purchased a mobile speed trailer which also contains a photo radar component. This speed trailer is located at various different locations daily in an effort to maintain a safe community and remind individuals to drive the posted speed limit. The posted speed limit throughout Grayhawk is 25 mph in the residential areas and varies from 45 mph on Thompson Peak Parkway and Hayden Road to 30 mph on 76th Street and Grayhawk Drive in the Park section of Grayhawk.

As most of you are also aware, the streets in the Retreat Village are private streets and are owned by Retreat Village Association (RVA). Consequently, the City of Scottsdale Police Department will not perform traffic control and issue speeding tickets on these streets, and it is the responsibility of the Retreat Village Association ensure that these streets are safe and to enforce the posted 25 mph speed limit. Some of you may have already received violation letters in the mail notifying you that you were observed by the photo radar exceeding the posted speed limit while driving within the Retreat Village. If you have been observed speeding by the photo radar on multiple occasions, you may have received a letter notifying you that a fine has been assessed to your association account.

The RVA Board of Directors is not intending to create a revenue stream (as some have suggested) or to be overly punitive to its homeowners, but rather is intending to keep a safe environment for all of its residents and their guests. We have joggers, bikers, walkers, and homeowners with baby strollers out in the community throughout the day as well as individuals in golf carts crossing Grayhawk Drive at numerous locations in the Retreat Village. The streets in the Retreat Village, especially in the neighborhoods, were designed to be driven at 25 mph – not 35-40 mph, which we see far too often.

If you live in the non-gated Park section of Grayhawk, you may have noticed the speed trailer in your neighborhood as well. While the Grayhawk Community Association cannot enforce the posted speed limit in this section of Grayhawk since the streets are public and under the jurisdiction of the City of Scottsdale, we are able to gather data on the number of drivers exceeding the posted speed limit and the average speed in a particular area. This information can then be used by the City of Scottsdale so they can deploy their photo radar equipment or have a police officer perform radar enforcement if they feel a location has become dangerous due to a high volume of speeders. This is especially important when school is in session with the increased number of children out in the neighborhoods before and after school.

I guess the bottom line is, while we have had very few collisions within Grayhawk in the past – especially in the residential neighborhoods – we want to continue to provide you with a safe community. Please slow down and observe the posted speed limit while you are driving within Grayhawk – those few extra seconds that you gain by speeding are really not worth it.

We'll talk again soon.

COMMITTEE REPORTS

Development Committee

David Van Omen reported that approximately 35 people attended the Pinnacle Peak West Area Drainage Master Study (ADMS) meeting presented by the Flood Control District of Maricopa County at Grayhawk Elementary School on September 16. Representatives gave a short presentation on flooding in the area and then opened the meeting up to questions.

It was noted that Fresh Box is the restaurant going in next to Cold Beer and Cheeseburgers in the Grayhawk Plaza on the SE corner of Scottsdale Road and Grayhawk Drive.

Operational Review Committee

Martha Troy reported that there had been several erosion issues recently throughout the community due to the storms and flooding.

It was noted that over 80 snakes had been captured over the summer by community patrol. This is up from previous years. A total will be calculated at the end of October.

The committee had discussed at length which service and delivery trucks were permitted in the Retreat without having to check in. Currently, UPS, FedEx and DHL are allowed but Staples, ON Track and others are required to check in under at least one resident name.

Landscape Committee

Arlene Smith reported that eight trees were lost and quite a few tree limbs were damaged due to the recent storms. A few of the currently scheduled projects, including the Signature Look and Ridgecrest railing projects, were postponed so that fall planting can take place.

The Grayhawk Community Association is currently in year two of the turf rotation project.

Community Enhancement Committee

Stacey Harvey reported that seven of the eight townhome/ condominium associations had submitted requests for funds through the Community Enhancement Committee. Submittals will be reviewed and approved per the standards and guidelines set by the Executive Committee in early 2014.

Programs Committee

Justin Martin reported that the CPR/AED Class, Thirsty Thursday Mixology Class and recent Wild Horse Pass Bus trip had been successful events.

The Autumn Farmer's Market and Bazaar was also very successful, and many of the vendors hope to return to Grayhawk for future events. There has been good resident feedback regarding the Farmer's Markets as well.

Upcoming events include a Single Sippers event at Dave and Busters, the Pumpkin Patch and Hallo-vino Wine Tasting.

A motion was made and approved to add Lou Ender and Pauline Gonsior to the Programs Committee.

Communications Committee

Jennifer Sheets reported she has been working with Barb Nelson to get additional financial information on to the community website. The information is intended to be easy to read for the average resident looking for a better overview of where the association's money comes from and how it is spent.

The GCA office has received 14 new Park Resident Information forms after two weeks of soliciting them through the Buzz weekly email blast. It was suggested that we have a booth at an upcoming event, where we can trade Grayhawk logo items for completed forms and agreed that we could start that initiative at the Grayhawk Pumpkin Patch.

Architectural Review Committee

Paul Alessio reported that eight submittals had been approved during the month of September. The committee has started to discuss possible upgrades to garage doors in the Park neighborhoods.

Budget/Finance Committee

Barb Nelson reported that based on recent Budget/Finance Committee meetings, it is anticipated that the proposed GCA assessment increase will be \$2 per month or \$1 per month if a portion of the GCA 2015 reserve contribution is funded through the GCA community enhancement fund.

The Budget/Finance Committee recommended that the GCA Board of Directors consider funding \$45,000.00 of the 2015 GCA reserve contribution through the GCA community enhancement fund which will reduce the 2015 GCA assessment rate increase to \$1.00 per month, making the 2015 assessment rate \$59.00 per month.

A motion was made and approved to increase the GCA assessment rate by \$1 per month and to fund \$45,000 of the 2015 GCA reserve contribution from the GCA Community Enhancement Fund.

Executive Committee

Linda Shaw shared a Grayhawk Strategic Planning Implementation Progress Report with the Board. Paul Alessio will be scheduling a meeting with Scottsdale City Councilmen Bob Littlefield and Guy Phillips. Michael Fee, Paul Alessio and David Van Omen will also be scheduling a meeting with Scottsdale city planners for north Scottsdale.

A motion was made an approved to pay \$31,543.36 from the GCA Community Enhancement Fund for community holiday

Election Committee

Michael Fee reported that the committee did not meet.

Treasurer's Report

Barb Nelson reported that the GCA had taken in over \$400,000 in Community Enhancement funds through August.

Management Report

Michael Fee reported the community painting project continues and the exterior walls in Avian along Thompson Peak Parkway and Hayden Road had been completed. Board surveys have been sent to Board members by CCMC.

The Architectural Review Committee has been working with Dunn Edwards on additional paint schemes for each Grayhawk neighborhood. As of the beginning of October, four additional color schemes have been approved for the Peregrine Villas, Halcon Villas, Crown Point Norte and Coventry (Park and Grayhawk) neighborhoods. How to donate

Simply pay the "grand total" on your Scottsdale utility bill, and \$1 will be directed to the program. The city annually distributes that money to various agencies that, in turn, assist thousands of people. These agencies provide services like teen suicide prevention, utility payment assistance, job training for those with mental disabilities and youth mentoring.

Scottsdale Cares in July divvied up \$140,000 to 12 agencies. Unfortunately, demand is far beyond the program's financial capacity. Twenty-seven agencies asked for a combined \$475,000 - that's more than triple the amount that was available. According to the city's Community Assistance Manager Michelle Albanese, requests have grown but Scottsdale Cares funding has dropped more than 40 percent in six years.





What is the Community Enhancement Fund Anyway?

Last month I did my best to give you a brief overview of the Grayhawk budget, including where our money comes from, what we spend it on and how we plan the budget for the coming year.

In addition to the operating budget, the Budget/Finance Committee and the Board of Directors continually manages the community Reserve Fund and the Community Enhancement Fund. I'll talk more next month on the Reserve Fund, but I wanted to focus this month on what the Community Enhancement Fund is and what we use it

When you purchased your Grayhawk home, you may remember paying a percentage of the purchase price of the house as a special fee. Or maybe you were lucky and were able to convince the seller to pay the fee. Either way, someone paid it. But what is the Community Enhancement Fee?

Years ago, the Grayhawk Board of Directors approved an amendment to the Covenants, Conditions and Restrictions which allowed for the establishment of a Community Enhancement Fund. This fund was intended for the purchase of future amenities and is not for maintenance of existing amenities, although the wording allows for Board discretion on spending.

Funds are collected at closing and payment can be negotiated between the buyer and seller. The Grayhawk Community Association (GCA) Community Enhancement Fee is currently ½ of 1% (.005) of total sales price of the home. The GCA fee will never be less than 1/8%

(.00125) or greater than 1/2% (.005) and can be changed by the GCA Board of Directors. The Retreat Village Association (RVA) has a separate association and a separate Community Enhancement Fund, which is paid upon the sale of a property in addition to the GCA fee. The RVA fee is currently 3/8 of 1% (.00375) of total sales price. The RVA fee will never be less than 1/16% (.000625) or more than 1/2% (.005) and can be changed by the RVA Board of Directors.

A one-time exemption to this fee is granted to every homeowner holding title by December 31, 1998. This exemption lasts for as long as the person owns the property. No matter when the property is sold, the transaction will not be subject to the fee. The one-time exemption expires when the property transfers and all future sales of that property are subject to the fee.

So, the long and short of it is that the Community Enhancement Fund is used for future enhancements to the community. If you've been here for a few years, you may have seen the new playground equipment go in, or the shade sails over the playground sets. Those were paid for with Community Enhancement funds.

Other recent expenditures have includes the Signature Look landscaping project, the expansion of the GCA office to include new meeting rooms, and new irrigation clocks and controllers for the community irrigation system.

The process for deciding where to spend Community Enhancement Funds is not always a speedy one, but that's a

good thing. It means that the decisions are being thought through and planned carefully. Proposals are taken to the Community Enhancement Committee for review. Those proposals can come from other committees (i.e. the Landscape Committee or Communications Committee), residents. condominium/townhome associations or other members of the Association. The committee reviews the requests and then submits a recommendation to the GCA Board of Directors, which they review at the next Board of Directors meeting.

The Executive Committee recently drew up a formal program for condominium associations which details stipulations for Community Enhancement requests, such as a deadline for requests for the coming year, how much will be spent overall and that no funds will be provided as a reimbursement to the condominium associations for projects that has been previously completed.

Rest assured that your neighbors serving on the Community Enhancement Committee and Board of Directors have your best interests in mind as they look at each request. They want to keep a close eye on where our money goes as much as I do (well, almost) but also make sure that we're making choices that keep our community as fresh, functional and beautiful as it always has been

Landscaping

Winter Water Management


In most households, the majority of water used is applied to the landscape. But now that the winter months are bringing cooler, wetter weather and the days are becoming shorter, you have an

opportunity reduce your water usage and save money on your water bill

Here are some tips and tricks that you can use to reduce water usage while still maintaining a healthy landscape:

- 1. As the weather continues to cool down, adjust your watering frequency and run time. You can use the interactive tools at www.wateruseitwisely.com to determine how often and how long the stations on your irrigation controller should run. If you have a desert adapted landscape, you can usually turn off your irrigation system from Thanksgiving to Valentine's Day.
- Take advantage of every rainfall. Turn your clock to the "off" or "rain" position and monitor plants for the first signs of wilting before reactivating.
- 3. Check to make sure your irrigation system is not leaking. With everything off, inside and out, observe the dial on your water meter (usually located in the front yard). If it is still turning, there is water leaking somewhere.
- Test the moisture depth in your soil. A screwdriver will move easily through most soil when it is wet, but will stop when it reaches dry soil. The roots of most shrubs are about 6" to 18" deep, grass roots are about 4" deep, and a large tree will have most of its roots within the first 24".

Household Tips

Avoiding Costly Sewer Backups This Holiday Season

Ham, turkey, gravy, mashed potatoes...all part of the perfect holiday meal! Unfortunately, they're also sources of fats, oil and grease - also known as FOG and some of the leading causes of sewer damage and backups.

Every day, FOG from people's homes is released into the sewer system, leading to line blockages that can ultimately cause sewer overflows, odors and pipe damage. And possibly worse (as you're preparing your holiday meal and have a house full of family and friends) FOG washed down the drain can quickly result in a partial or complete backup of your home's sewer system, causing a messy and costly plumbing emergency.

Helpful tips to prevent FOG from entering the drain:

- Pour cooking oils and grease into a small container with absorbent material, such as a paper towel or coffee grounds, and dispose of it in the trash.
- Scrape food from dishes into the trash (not the garbage disposal) and wipe down greasy plates, pots and pans with a paper towel before washing.
- Prevent food from entering your sewer by covering your kitchen sink drain with a strainer and limiting your use of garbage disposals.

ABDI Cleanup

If you live in the Retreat Village, you are likely familiar with the ABDI gate entry system. Park residents (the non-gated area of Grayhawk between Scottsdale Road and Hayden Road) may not be aware, though, that ABDI is also used by security staff to access Park resident information as needed. Having your information in ABDI, whether in the Park or the Retreat Village, is the best way for security to reach you after regular business hours should you have an irrigation leak, garage door left open or any other number of potential issues.

If you are a Park resident and you have not completed the Park Resident Information Form, please contact Pam Heavrin at the Grayhawk Community Association office at 480-563-9708 or pheavrin@ccmcnet.com to obtain a form, or visit www.grayhawkcommunity.org.

If you live in the Retreat Village and have never taken the time to learn how to use ABDI, we encourage you to make this a goal. It is incredibly easy! Not only can you add and delete permanent, temporary and duration guests; you can update contact information and verify your vehicle information. Doing all of these things helps to ensure a smooth entry for yourself and your guests. It also alleviates some of the phone calls that the guardhouse receives and allows our Trident Security staff to focus on checking visitors in through the gates.

Whether you are a novice or an expert, please take the time to log into your ABDI account and do some cleaning up of your guest list information. The right phone number always helps us find you faster, and a concise, up-to-date guest list is much easier for the guards to find your guests quickly.

To access your account, visit www.grayhawkcommunity.org and log in as a resident. Go to the Resident Services tab and then ABDI. If you do not have your login and password, there is an option to request them on that page. Once you are logged into ABDI, you can manage your guest list by adding, deleting and updated your guest information.

If you will be hosting a holiday party this year, please remember to drop off a complete guest list to the guardhouse if you are not adding those guests to your ABDI account. The guards will call on every guest that they have not been notified of prior to the party. If you are busy having fun and don't hear your phone ring, your guest may be denied admittance, and that is no way to spread holiday cheer!

HAVE YOU SIGNED UP FOR **E-STATEMENTS YET?**

As of December 2013, 454 owners in Grayhawk have signed up for E-statements. That's 12.5%. Each sign up saves the Association at least \$3 per year. So far, we're saving about \$1,362!



Scottsdale Police Department Uses Technology to Improve Services


Were you aware that as a Scottsdale resident you have a free tool to map and analyze crime activity in your community?

Crime data in Scottsdale is being displayed through the Web site RAIDS Online: http://www.raidsonline.com

RAIDS stands for Regional Analysis and Information Data Sharing. The free Web site provides crime data which users can search, filter and analyze via an interactive dashboard. Residents also can sign up for alerts about criminal activity occurring in their neighborhood.


Crimes listed on the site include both persons and property and cover both residential and commercial crimes. The locations are rounded to the hundred block address level to protect victim confidentiality.

We also sampled both the Greek and Italian Bruschetta. The Greek featured reduced roasted peppers, goat cheese, garlic and pepper jam. The Italian was prosciutto, figs, pepper jam and mascarpone cheese.

On a quest for the perfect skinny margarita, I choose to try their take. It was very refreshing! Jenn enjoyed a glass of cabernet sauvignon. Happy Hours at *The Living Room* feature \$5 glasses of wine, \$3 well drinks, \$2.50 drafts and \$5 specialty cocktails from 11 a.m. to 6 p.m. daily.

They also offer an ever-changing selection of boutique wines that are exclusively available at **The Living Room**. On Fridays and Saturdays, **The Living Room** kicks it up a notch with a live DJ, and on Sundays they offer a feature guitarist.

Citywide park curfew is 10:30 pm for all ages.



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


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
